Happily, Dr. Wang will continue his research and other projects at Matsui Nursery, Inc. in Salinas, California. This should all happen in the fall, with an October time target.

Matsui Nursery, Inc. was started by Andy Matsui in 1967, and began conversion to the production of potted orchid plants in 1998. With the conversion complete, Matsui is now the largest producer of potted orchids in the world. Greenhouse production facilities are approximately 3.5 million square feet.

Dr. Wang will join our good friend Andy Easton at Matsui. Sounds like a great orchid team in the making. We will all benefit from their work.

WRIGHT THINKING

This spring has been one of the toughest growing weather periods we've ever seen. Too much storm and too little sun made a bad combination. Unfortunately, the consequences of unusual early-year weather will last well into the growing season for that year. With that in mind, let's consider a few things we might do to make it better.

First of all, there will be fungus among us. Just about every kind of fuzzy growth you can imagine – and some you can't. Fortunately, fungus can be easily controlled if it is caught early enough or anticipated. Step one to control (as in most greenhouse pests) is cleanliness. Clean the benches, sweep the floor and empty all trash containers. Make up a gallon or so of a couple of ounces of Clorox, a teaspoonful of dishwashing soap and water to make a gallon. Spray on benches, floors and walks, but not directly on the plants. If algae is growing on the walls, add another ounce of Clorox, spray the walls, let stand 20 – 30 minutes and then hose off cleaner and algae together. While those trash containers are empty, do the same thing to them! Then take a minute to enjoy the smell of a clean, disinfected greenhouse. It won't replace the joy of a fragrant flower but it sure will beat that musty old "fixing to mold" smell.

Next, watch for fungus on the plants. In a hobby greenhouse, we can't always use the big guns that are so effective in commercial production houses. We can, however, remember the Achilles heel of fungi: they hate having their ambient pH changed. An effective way to discourage fungus is to spray plants with a solution of a tablespoonful of baking soda in water to make a gallon. Spray the whole plant, but try not to get much of the solution on the medium or down into the pot. As insurance, on the day following use of baking soda spray, water the pots heavily but keep as much water as possible off the plants. Those of you who raise landscapes may find the baking powder spray effective against fungus diseases on roses and powdery mildew on crape myrtle, as well.

Another good treatment is the same for us as it is for our plants: wash well with soap and water. A good general purpose spray may be prepared from a teaspoonful of dishwashing soap in a gallon of water. Most bugs find this mix distasteful and some even find it harmful to health. In the days before DDT and other commercial chemicals, we used soap sprays as the first line of defense to control a myriad of pests. Soapy water sprays are not very residual so you will have to apply them every few days, but they are excellent 'area' sprays to knock down an infestation quickly and with utmost plant safety. A bit later this summer, when the weather becomes hot and dry, you will want to attack two spotted mite (red spider) with our old favorite: one pint rubbing alcohol, one pint 409 cleaner and water to make a gallon.

If you just **MUST** use stronger sprays, consider some of the new general purpose plant chemicals developed by Bayer. They are available under the "Advanced" label at home improvement stores. Always test a small sample on a leaf or two before you douse your whole collection.

These simple and relatively safe care techniques should give you and your plants a healthy and happy summer. They will be even more effective if used in a growing situation where air movement is good and food is ample.

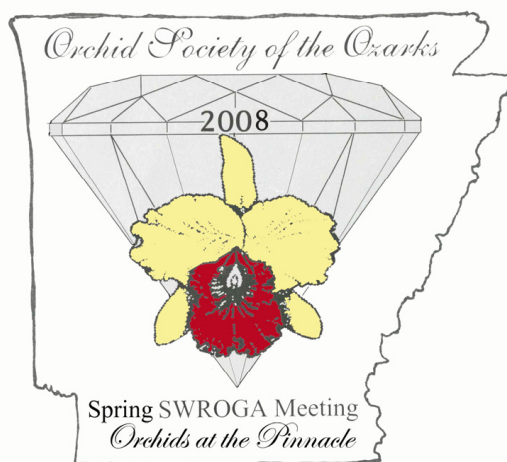

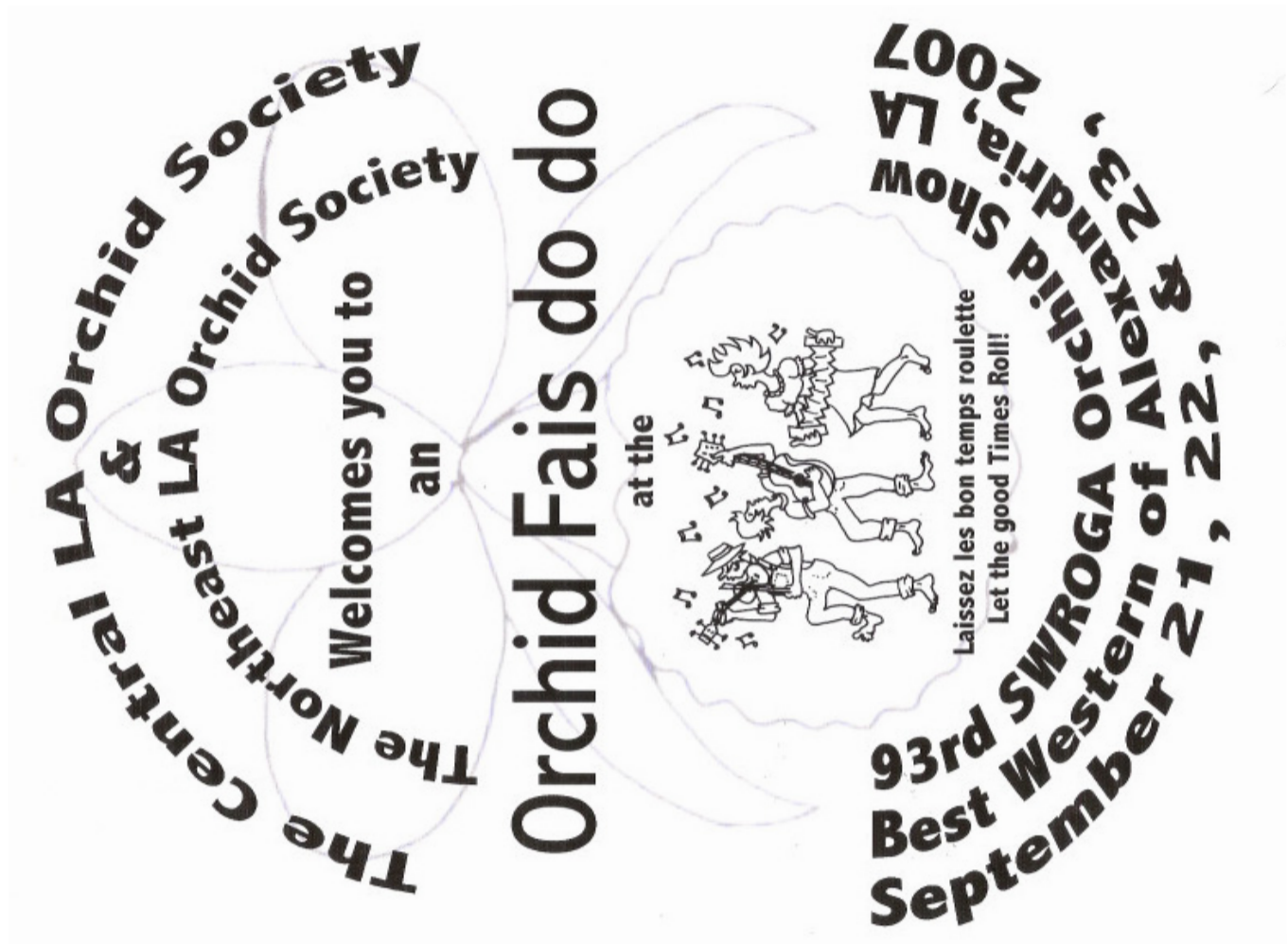
Shreveport Orchid Society Wins the Distinguished Affiliated Society Service Award (DASSA).

A society must have been in existence a minimum of 15 years (the Shreveport society was established in 1960), and other areas of consideration include long-term sponsorship of shows, public education projects, conservation efforts, orchid workshops, development and distribution of an outstanding newsletter, and significant support of an AOS judging center.

The award will actually be presented at the dinner on October 20, 2007, in Delray since the fall meetings do not have the Affiliated Societies Committee breakfast.

Art's father is an authority on *Cattleya* species having written 28 articles for the American Orchid Society and a book entitled 'Classic *Cattleyas*' that was released in 2006 and shown on national TV on the Martha Stewart Show.
